# FROM THE MANSE

There is great excitement in the manse family as we look forward to the wedding of our daughter Jenny and her fiancé, Sandy. Under normal circumstances, a wedding is a time when members of both families travel the length and breadth of the country to meet together and witness the vows of marriage being shared. After the last couple of years with strict COVID regulations, this is something we are not taking for granted and

are looking forward to seeing people once again if they can make it.

One scripture reading that is often used at weddings, is Paul's letter to the Corinthians. "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. <sup>5</sup> It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. <sup>6</sup> Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. <sup>7</sup> It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres." (1 Corinthians 13: 4-7) It's timeless isn't it? There is enough here to reflect on for a lifetime and still not exhaust it. One thing about love that stands out for me is the willingness to believe the best in another person. We read about Jesus doing this all the time. Where others condemned, Jesus offered forgiveness, where others saw evil, he saw good. He saw the best in people. It seems to me that this is what we are called to do as Christians. We are to see the positives and not just the negatives in people (and the circumstances) in which we find ourselves.

On one wall of Dunbarney Church hangs a lovely banner. It was the first banner that was made during my ministry in Dunbarney and Forgandenny Church and designed by Thelma Pedgrift. It shows light passing through a prism and separated out into all the different colours. Just as all the various colours of the spectrum work together to make

white light, so Paul describes love in its component parts – a rainbow of actions that all work together to make true love. As we read Paul's description, it becomes clear that he is not talking about a warm feeling but rather a conscious decision to love other people no matter what.

For this reason, it is an important reading to listen to at any time and not just at weddings. At a time when there is so much uncertainty and anxiety being experienced by others, we need to hear a call to remain positive, see the best in others and be encouraging.

You will read in this edition of *Parish Voice* of the Presbytery planning process which continues throughout these summer months. This work is necessary and we should approach it with prayer and openness. It must not, however, distract us from the more immediate tasks of encouraging each other in the works of outreach, service, discipleship, to which God has called us and which through the rainbow of actions work together and show God's love. For all the ways that you are doing this already, thank you.

The Scripture Union Stamp Bureau has

raised thousands of pounds in the last 16 years alone through the sale of used stamps. Could you help raise even more in this creative way?

Who would have thought that stamps,

even those of the common everyday variety, could be worth so much? Enter Scripture Union supporter, Steve Ellis, a seasoned stamp collector from Stoke-on-Trent.

Steve has been running the SU Stamp Bureau since taking over the reins 16 years ago. In that time, he's raised an amazing £24,102 for Scripture Union by selling used stamps. Steve is looking to continue in this creative fundraising venture, but he needs your help.

'I can find a market for virtually any stamp that isn't damaged, even the more common ones,' says Steve. 'Unfortunately, I am receiving fewer stamps to sell nowadays and there are fewer collectors looking to buy.' Can you help Steve keep the bureau alive? Do you have any used stamps (either small amounts or larger collections) or perhaps you collect and could help by buying some of Steve's stamps?

Top tip! It helps if stamps that are torn from the envelope are trimmed with a small margin. Old stamps (pre-1945) have more value if left on the envelope.

We are very mindful of the fact that 2022 is proving to be a challenging year for many households, but of course the same is true within the Church, with our resources being stretched by increasing costs. Your prayerful giving allows us to continue our good work and participate in God's plan of generosity in the world.

Please also remember that you can help us maximise your donations by signing up for the Gift Aid scheme. If you are a UK taxpayer, this scheme allows us to claim an additional 25p for every £1 you donate. If you're

# A RADICAL PLAN FOR THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND

In 2019, the General Assembly called for a "Radical Action Plan" to refocus the whole Church of Scotland on its core mission. This was also to face realities: falling membership, fewer ministers, declining finances, and too many expensive buildings.

The Assembly defined the core mission of the Church in terms of the "five marks of mission":

- 1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- 2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service
- 4. To transform unjust structures of society, to pursue peace and reconciliation
- 5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation

Facts are facts: in 2021 the Church had 700 ministers in post, and 137 deacons and parish workers. The Kirk also had 300 vacant congregations, and 35% of ministers will be 65 within 5 years. Something has to change. The General Assembly agreed that there should only be 600 paid ministries – and no more than 60 vacancies - at any one time. That means reducing the number of posts in the current Presbytery Plans from over 1000 to 660. About a 40% cut.

This cannot mean every congregation arguing to keep "their minister". It means new and imaginative thinking about how we shape the Church in each community, in order that we focus on mission.

We meet in the church hall usually on the third Wednesday of the month at 7.30pm. Tea, coffee and biscuits as well as time to chat are always an important part of the evening.

Each year we choose a charity to support and this year we have chosen 2 local children's charities:

- The Katie McKerracher Trust brain tumours (Diffuse Pontine Glioma) in children, supporting children and their families financially and in other practical ways.
- Siblings Reunited (STAR) reunites brothers and sisters separated in the care system, by providing quality and regular opportunities tomeet up with siblings.

Our main fundraiser for this will be a concert by Perth Rock Choir on Friday 7th October in Dunbarney Church and proceeds from the concert will be split between the two charities.
