FROM THE MANSE

"When are you ever going to open a bottle of *that* wine?" I am not referring to that wonderful Friday evening moment after a long week, but to a bottle of wine (in fact two bottles) which I bought many years ago when my children were very young. We



were on holiday in the south of France and I could not resist a visit to a small village that produces iconic French wines and which is known worldwide. We enjoyed walking around the village of Châteauneuf-du-Pape, but I was eventually drawn into one wine cellar where I agreed to buy two bottles of red wine. As soon as I agreed to this, I knew that it was going to be expensive. The bottles were wax sealed and placed carefully in its packaging. My credit card needed to be used!

These two bottles still lie unopened in the manse. And every so



often, I hear these words, "when are you going to open a bottle of *that* wine?" When I bought them, I said that they would be opened either on a 21st birthday or at a wedding. These milestones have passed! I guess, I am rather concerned that after so much time, I will be

desperately disappointed by what is inside.

It's hard to ignore the prominence of wine in the Bible. In March we celebrated communion and despite conducting such a service using well-rehearsed words, I still find it to be powerful and special. We are also approaching Easter – the most significant time for a Christian –

and again to the wonderfully deep services of Holy Week especially Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, shared with friends from neighbouring churches.

At these services we remember that just before Jesus went to the cross, he began what's known as 'The Lord's Supper', or Holy Communion. He said that the cup of wine represented his blood poured out for us. "Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me." Following the resurrection, Jesus walked and talked with Cleopas



and another person on the road to Emmaus, explaining to them that everything that had happened. They said, "'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. ³⁰ When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. ³¹ Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him! (Luke 24:29-31). Over a glass of wine and some bread, Jesus met with them and their eyes were opened and they recognised him in a way they never had before and they were deeply moved. And the same is true today.



As we take a thimble full of wine there is something deeply enriching when we remember Jesus' love for us. We remember that God doesn't just love – God *lavishes* us with love (1 John 3:1). And this love is to change us from the

inside out and we are to love others. Elsewhere we read that God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. (1 John 4: 16)

"Taste and see that the Lord is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in him." So back to the question, "When are you ever going to open that bottle of wine?" I think the answer might be very soon. I will

never know how good it is until I have tasted it. The Psalmist said something similar. "Taste and see that the Lord is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in him." (Psalm 34: 8) The wine I bought might be terrible, but the wine that Jesus pours out is never

TREASURER'S REPORT

Grant Funding: Our Cosy Space project has been a great success, thanks to the support of funding secured from the National Lottery Community Fund, PKC Cost of Living Community Fund and the



Cameron Group Charitable Trust. This funding has enabled us to not only open up the church hall each Friday to provide a warm space with hot food and drinks available but has also allowed us to

work in collaboration with the Bridge of Earn Baby & Toddler Group. This support has meant that they have been able to offer their sessions free of charge for the first quarter of the year, and are providing warm snacks to both children and their carers at each session.

I am delighted to confirm that we have also been successful in securing funding of £13,500 from the PKC Community Investment Fund to establish our 'Big Brig Youth Project'. Among other things, this will allow us to enlist the services of a trained Youth Worker from KYTHE throughout 2023.

2022 Accounts: Full details of our annual accounts will be provided at the Stated Annual Meeting on 19th March, although I am pleased to report that we started the year in a reasonably healthy financial position, ending 2022 with a surplus of £7,224, excluding restricted Cosy Space funding and refurbishment project donations. However, this surplus was largely because we were fortunate to have received a £1,000 legacy, and our fabric expenditure was considerably lower than usual. Our general offerings were actually £1,500 less than in 2021. The 2023 budget proposed by the Finance Committee shows a deficit of -£8,183. We anticipate a tricky year ahead, with cost of living concerns and all fundraising being rightly focused on the refurbishment project. I would therefore encourage everyone to prayerfully consider their offerings at this time, remembering what a privilege and gift it is to be able to support the work of our church.

Gift Aid: The Church of Scotland recommend that all gift aid donors should check each year that you are still paying enough tax to cover your gift aid payment. The easiest way to do this is to divide what you give by 4 and check that you have paid that amount in tax. If you are unsure, please feel free to contact me in confidence and I can arrange to have this checked for you. If you are aware that you no longer qualify to make gift aid payments or you wish to become a gift aid donor, please let me know. This is a fantastic way to generate additional income for the church (25p for each £1 donated) without it costing you any extra.

THE BIBLE COURSE

Over eight weeks on a Thursday evening for one hour via Zoom, about 20 people from across the Lower Earn Churches have been discussing and learning how key events, books and characters in the Bible all fit together.



The Bible Society produced, *The Bible Course* and it is designed to give people the 'big picture' of the Bible: Instead of focussing intensively on a few verses or even a single book, takes people through the scriptures from Genesis to Revelation. It aims to show them the arc of its narrative and how the different parts inter-relate. It really exceeded all my expectations. The course divides the Bible into eight sessions:

- Introducing the Bible
- Creation & Covenant

- Exodus & Promised Land
- Judges & Kings
- Exile & Prophets
- Jesus & the Gospels
- Acts & the Church
- Revelation & Review

The course is based around a high-quality video presentation by Dr Andrew Ollerton, who apparently developed it originally to help people in Corpuell new to the Christian

people in Cornwall new to the Christian faith. The timeline of the Bible that he had created really helped people put the different parts together and understand the



different parts together and understand the genres of literature we find in the Bible.

The films can be downloaded free from the Bible Society's website after you register but the booklets must be ordered by post.

1893. A step to moderising the church came in 1910 when Aberdalgie and Dunbarney Churches received gifts of American Organs. The minister looked to make further changes but that was delayed by the impact of the First World War and its aftermath.

It was the Pullar family at Dunbarney House who were to assist greatly in Clark's ambition to modernise the church building. The original pulpit was on the middle of the long south wall with porches at both east and west ends and galleries on three sides facing the pulpit. After undergoing extensive works over seven months the church was reopened on Sunday 6th May 1923. The interior renovation was completed by removing the east porch and gallery to create a chancel and moving the pulpit to the chancel thus aligning the church to east/west. It was through the generosity of Mr & Mrs Laurence Pullar of Dunbarney that these extensive alterations were funded. The opening service was taken by the Rev. Dr. Martin, ex-Moderator of the CofS who had preached there as a young licentiate forty years earlier. He commented that it was gratifying that the fine work had been executed by local tradesmen.

Every Sunday sitting in the sanctuary we are reminded of that major work by the beautifully carved Communion Table with the date 1923 in bold letters facing the congregation.

Who was the crasftsman who produced the beautiful oak table and the oak wall screens of the chancel?

In all probability he was the local master joiner William Whittet (1880 – 1966) who lived at Laburnum Cottage, Back Street, Bridge of Earn. Later he made the large lectern in 1940 and the font twelve years further on. The Rev T. Stewart Thomsom who was minister of Dunbarney from 1948 to 1958 knew that much of the woodwork in the church had been carved by the village carpenter, Willie Wittet, whose family had been in the village for three hundred years or so and whose ancestor, Andrew Wittet, had made the box to hold the two communion cups in 1693. He asked him to make a chair to

stand behind the Communion Table, which Willie did, carving a beautiful burning bush on its back. When Tom commented that none of the congregation would see it, Willie replied, " Ah but, Minister, God will see it!"

In reviewing the past. can contemplate on the ambitions and which each generation frustrations experiences. With vet another 100 years service in Dunbarney Church building, the Congregation now look to modernise the sanctuary and just as war and the effect of a world pandemic of influenza frustrated the previous maior refurbishment we see mirrored the all too similar external effects causing delay.

In due course however we shall achieve

our goal and hopefully be able to commence the modernisation in this Centenary year.

ANOTHER CENTENARY

When researching the 1923 renovation of our church building I turned to the AK Bell library records of the Perthshire Advertiser. Immediately it became obvious that the main topic of news was the start of national broadcasting by the BBC. John Reith, a 33-year-old Scottish engineer, had been appointed General Manager of the BBC at the end of 1922. The new company was due to start on Monday January 1st, 1923.

Archibald Fleming, minister of St. Columba's Church of Scotland, Pont Street, London, delivered a New Year's Eve address by wireless from the London Broadcasting Station.

From castle to cottage it was now possible to listen to opera and classical music or latest news bulletins at your own fireside albeit the "wireless" apparatus was bulky and valve sets fairly expensive.

W. B. M'Callum Optician, Electrical end Photographic Store, 8 Scott Street. Perth was quick to see the commercial opportunities and promoted listening demonstrations and advertised various models for sale or build your own wireless kits.

An article "Wireless Explained" appeared in February in the PA.

"Listening-in" immediately caught on with newspaper photographs of enthusiasts in groups sitting around bulky panels with large megaphone horns, and some with headphones.

Demonstrations were held in several villages and seeing, the possibilities of in-car entertainment motor showrooms joined in. In early March, Scottish broadcasting began from an attic in Glasgow.

A Wireless Concert was given at Perth Infirmary in late March 1923 and soon afterwards the soldiers recovering in Kilgraston Hospital were entertained by a similar concert. Also at this time Jeanfield Social Club held a Listening-In and St Stephen's U.F. Church held a wireless concert in their hall in King Street. The PA commented that wireless telephony was becoming one of the most popular means of entertainment, and that in Perth there were many enthusiasts.

Not all were happy with this public "listening-in", for the Licensing Court disapproved of this innovation for an Abernethy inn!

There is no doubting the impact of the radio on our lives since then.

I could not fail to notice that the other well reported news items of the PA of 1923 were the numbers of concerts given by local choral. operatic and entertainment groups based and supported in almost every village of that time. Many of these too, if at the weekend, were followed by late night dances. We can listen easily to the radio on our own but perhaps society has lost some of the joy of participating or sharing in the experience of local entertainment gatherings.
